### **Altimetric profile**




Min elevation 1101 m Max elevation 1308 m

From L'Espérou, head for the Col de Montals pass, first on the D548a, then on the D548.

Continue on the D548 to the Col de la Broue pass (optional side trip on foot to see the Orgon waterfalls, 5 minutes away).

1. At the Col de la Broue, return to L'Espérou on the D48n via the Col du Minier, then on the D986a.

## Is in the midst of the park

The national park is an unrestricted natural area but subjected to regulations which must be known by all visitors.



#### **A** Advices

Before committing yourself to a circuit, ensure that it is suitable for your activity level and ability. Respect traffic laws and other road users; stay in control of your speed and trajectory. Make sure to be seen and travel in single file when in a group. Remember that the weather changes quickly in the mountains. Take enough water. Safe trip!
